

# **Ancient History Programs**

Online programs - Stage 6

Macquarie University's Department of History and Archaeology is now offering online Ancient History programs for schools. *Studying the Past* is the Faculty of Arts' education and engagement initiative which focuses on facilitating engaging curriculum-linked workshops and programs.

Our online workshops aim to engage high school students in curriculum-based workshops that focus on fostering a passion and interest in the study of the ancient past. There is focus on demonstrating the wealth of online resources available to students and how these can be used to complement students' studies. Resources used in workshops may include Macquarie University museum collections, international cultural heritage institution catalogues, research institution archives and virtual tours of archaeological sites.

Our programs concentrate on how students can utilise material and archaeological evidence to support their arguments and conclusions. Artefact analysis and interpretation of archaeological evidence is a key component of our workshops.

### **PROGRAMS ON OFFER**

Each workshop runs for <u>up to an hour</u> in length and delivered via your schools preferred video conferencing platform (i.e. Zoom, Skype, Microsoft Teams). All security protocols will be followed to ensure safe delivery.

## Workshop 1: Women in Greece and Rome

A topic that is almost completely reliant on archaeological evidence. This workshop provides students with an array of sources that represent ancient women – from Red and Black Figure pottery, frescos and mosaics, funerary epitaphs, sarcophagi, and statuary and monumental remains.

This topic can be tailored to study the representation of elite women, especially Agrippina the Younger

# Workshop 2: Ethics and Preservation of Cultural Heritage

This topic tackles some of the many ethical issues and political disputes which surround the ownership, regulation, and care of cultural property. Both Australian and international case studies are analysed and used to facilitate the discussion of a multitude of issues including: the preservation of heritage sites, the repatriation of cultural property and ethical issues relating to the display of human remains.

# Workshop 3: Egyptian Art and Architecture

Pyramids, tombs, and temples - three key aspects of Egyptian religion and culture. Learn about Old Kingdom burial practices, take a virtual tour of a New Kingdom tomb, see what it is like for an archaeologist excavating a tomb, or learn how archaeologists decipher how monumental temples were made *and used*.

### LEARNING RESOURCES

Additionally, each workshop comes with a suite of worksheets. These include scaffolded activities designed to complement and reinforce key themes addressed in the workshop and to further develop skills in the evaluation and critical analysis of sources. These resources are linked directly to several learning outcomes in the Stage 6 syllabus and can be used as an assessment piece.

These activities may be completed at the teacher's discretion.
