Associate Professor Reema Harrison



Associate Professor Reema Harrison, Centre for Health Systems and Safety Research, Australian Institute of Health Innovation, Macquarie University

Reema Harrison (BSc hons Psychology; MSc Health Psychology; PhD in Psychology of Patient Safety) is a mixed-methods researcher with a strong track record of translational health systems and services research. Reema leads a program of research investigating how increasing stakeholder engagement can contribute to improved healthcare quality, experiences and outcomes. Her work has sought to generate, investigate and evaluate models of care through a lens of diversity, specifically in relation to culturally and linguistically diverse communities and people with intellectual disabilities.

With a background in Psychology, Reema has devised and validated tools to evaluate patient and clinician experiences of care in a range of contexts. She has also published on the use and quality of peer support, mentorship and co-design approaches for creating change to enhance healthcare experiences and outcomes.

Professor Johanna Westbrook



Professor Johanna Westbrook, Centre for Health Systems and Safety Research, Australian Institute of Health Innovation, Macquarie University

Johanna Westbrook (PhD, FTSE, FAIDH, FACMI, FIAHSI) is internationally recognised for her research evaluating the effects of information and communication technology in health care, which has led to significant advances in our understanding of how clinical information systems deliver (or fail to deliver) expected benefits. Her highly applied research has supported translation of this evidence into policy, practice, and IT system design changes.

Johanna was named Australian ICT professional of the year in 2014 and in 2019 as the national research leader in the field of medical informatics. Johanna has over 500 publications and been awarded > \$50M in research grants.

In 2019, Johanna received the Elizabeth Blackburn Investigator Award (Health Services Research) from the NHMRC. In 2020, she was appointed as a Co-Director of the Safety, Quality and Informatics Leadership program, by the Harvard Medical School.

Johanna was awarded Research Australia's prestigious Health Services Research Award in 2022 recognising her leadership in health services research and defining contributions to the development of the field.

Ms Marina Chand, Co-Chair of the Australian Multicultural Health Collaborative, World Wellness Group Co-founder

Marina Chand is one of the three co-founders of World Wellness Group, a multicultural health social enterprise in Brisbane. Marina is also the Co-Chair of the Australian Multicultural Health Collaborative, the national peak for multicultural health. With a background in health promotion and traditional medicine, her career spans more than 28 years in the health sector; in government and not-for-profit organisations.

Marina has a keen interest in multicultural data collection, multicultural marketing and communications, culturally tailored health service design, and holistic health models. She leads the social impact measurement work at World Wellness Group. Marina is also a community leader on the north-side of Brisbane where she and her family lead a temple community comprising thousands of newly settled and established migrants. Her professional and personal life are immersed in multiculturalism, she is also a carer and has extensive lived experience with the NDIS and aged care service sector.

Mrs Thit Tieu, Founder and Chair of Sisters' Cancer Support Group Inc. M.A. (Applied Linguistics), B.Ed. (Science), Dip T.E.F.L. (University of Sydney), Graduate Diploma in Public Sector Management (University of Western Sydney), Founder and Chair of Sisters' Cancer Support Group Inc.

Thit Tieu is the retired Operations Manager of NSW Adult Migrant English Service. Her career spanned over 30 years working in education and training and management within the Department of Education and Training working with the multicultural communities, newly arrived immigrants and refugees.

After her life changing experience with cancer, she founded "Sisters' Cancer Support Group Inc." (SCSG), the Illawarra based not-for-profit charity organisation which supports women and carers from CALD communities.

As a strong advocate for cancer survivors from multicultural backgrounds, Thit shares her lived experience and knowledge of multicultural communities' needs in a range of consumer engagement committees, panels and cancer research projects. She is a member of the Cancer Institute NSW "Community and Consumer Advisor Panel" and the "NSW Primary Health Care Cancer Advisory Group." She contributed in the development of the 2022 -2027 NSW Cancer Plan as the member of "NSW Cancer Plan Governance Committee."

Thit is on the CanEngage Advisory Committee and also an associate investigator of the CanEngage Research project.

Thit was a recipient of 2023 Wollongong City Council "Senior Citizen of the Year" Award. She is also the winner of Multicultural Health Communication Awards – "Community Representative of the Year" in 2022.







Ms Antoinette Abdelseed



Ms Antoinette Abdelseed, Consumer Co-facilitator, founder Angels of Mercy Welfare Services

Antoinette Abdelseed is the founder and director of Angels of Mercy Welfare Services. Angels of Mercy helps newly arrived migrants and refugees from Africa. The program has helped many migrants discover a sense of inclusion into Australian society.

For Antoinette, the journey began in 1998 when she started a new initiative in NSW to deliver mobile services to emerging communities which was adopted by the government in 2004, when she founded Angels of Mercy. Antoinette has also initiated programs in partnership with different providers for Pathways for Primary Industries for Africans e.g. farming programs and employment and training programs. She has also partnered with different government bodies including Centrelink and TAFE.

In recognition of her work to provide opportunities for migrant communities, Antoinette has received a number of awards. In 2013, Antoinette won the Mulgoa Woman of the Year award in the Western Sydney Region of Sydney. In 2014 she was awarded the Welfare Sector Award as an outstanding community leader in NSW. Also in 2014, Angels of Mercy was recognised with the State Finalist Award for Excellence in Volunteer Management.

Antoinette was awarded a certificate of Recognition in 2014 from NSW Parliament for motivating and encouraging leaders from conflicting tribes to work together and plan harmony projects for their communities. She initiated training and support plans for the organisation of a yearly Sudanese event which was attended by over 1800 people. In 2017, she was awarded the Lifetime Community Service medal through Multicultural NSW.

Antoinette's mission is to share her journey as a Sudanese woman who came to Australia in 1989, building strong partnerships with different organisations and programs across Australia. Her capacity-building projects and training programs, underpinned by a combination of client-centred social practice and skills-based approaches, not only develops people's personal and work skills but enhances well-being and motivation. Antoinette seeks to expand people's horizons and bring out the best out in them.
